1	Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2	tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
3	SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
4	This Act may be cited as the "Primary Care Team
5	Education Centers Act" or the "PCTEC Act".
6	SEC. 2. PURPOSES.
7	The purposes of this Act are—
8	(1) to establish and expand primary care team

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education centers to—

1	(A) enhance and support the capacity of
2	community-based ambulatory patient care cen-
3	ters to serve as sites to develop the next genera-
4	tion of health professionals to care for the
5	needs of communities; and
6	(B) develop and implement innovative em-
7	ployment, appointment, and compensation mod-
8	els to enhance and expand preceptors in pri-
9	mary care; and
10	(2) to improve access to care by ensuring that
11	more health professional students have clinical edu-
12	cation experiences in multidisciplinary primary care
13	settings.
14	SEC. 3. PRIMARY CARE TEAM EDUCATION CENTERS.

"(c) Use of Funds.—An eligible entity receiving a
grant under subsection (a) shall use grant funds to estab-
lish or expand a primary care team education center to—
"(1) develop or enhance partnerships with insti-
tutions of higher education that provide a recognized
postsecondary credential in health care, or health
care organizations that the Secretary has determined
are capable of carrying out such a grant or contract,
to—
"(A) address clinical faculty, clinical site,
and clinical preceptor shortages for health pro-
fessionals by—
"(i) establishing mutually beneficial
and sustainable agreements for precepting
by the clinical staff of the primary care
team education center, through innovative
employment, appointment, and compensa-
tion models designed to enhance—
"(I) recruitment and retention of
such staff; and
"(II) the role of such staff in en-
suring the effectiveness and sustain-
ability of the clinical site as part of

6	"(d) AWARD BASIS.—In selecting recipients for
7	grants under subsection (a), the Secretary shall give pri-
8	ority to grant applications that—
9	"(1) demonstrate how the program to be sup-
10	ported under the grant will, for the region to be
11	served—
12	"(A) identify the health professions with
13	labor shortages; and
14	"(B) increase the number of health profes-
15	sionals with disadvantaged backgrounds work-
16	ing in such health professions; and
17	"(2) provide preceptor training and support to
18	encourage eligible preceptors to participate in clin-
19	ical training, including nurses and advanced practice
20	nurses.
21	"(e) Limitation.—The recipient of a grant under
22	section 749A or 340H shall not be eligible to receive a
23	grant under subsection (a).
24	"(f) TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE.—

1	"(1) In General.—The Secretary shall, di-
2	rectly or through grants or contracts, provide tech-
3	nical assistance for eligible entities receiving grants
4	under subsection (a).
5	"(2) Limitation.—For each year, the Sec-
6	retary shall use not more than 5 percent of the
7	amount made available to carry out this section for
8	technical assistance under this subsection.
9	"(g) Annual Report.—The Secretary shall submit
10	an annual report to Congress on the grants awarded under
11	subsection (a). Each such report shall, at a minimum, in-
12	clude—
13	"(1) the total number of grants awarded under
14	subsection (a);
15	"(2) a description of the primary care team
16	education centers supported under each such grant;
17	"(3) the number of students, by profession, who
18	engaged in such primary care team education cen-
19	ters during the applicable academic year, in the ag-
20	gregate and disaggregated by grantee;
21	"(4) in the aggregate and disaggregated by
22	grantee—
23	"(A) the number of health professional
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1	ters engaged in classroom teaching or clinical

5	care team' means a team of 2 or more health pro-

8	with patients and their caregivers, to the extent pre-
9	ferred by each patient, to accomplish shared goals
10	within and across settings in order to achieve coordi-
11	nated, high-quality care.
12	"(i) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There is
13	authorized to be appropriated to carry out this section—
14	"(1) $$10,000,000$ for fiscal year 2025 ;
15	"(2) $$25,000,000$ for fiscal year 2026 ;
16	"(3) $$50,000,000$ for fiscal year 2027; and
